- What do you know about the context that can help you to develop your interpretation of the meaning/message?

Developing a Response: introduction and thesis statement

What is the keyword in the question?

What are you being asked to do?

What is your idea in response to this?

What do you 'believe' in response to the question?

What are you trying to prove?

How will you prove this? What will you focus on?

What direction will you take your essay in?

What are your main points or ideas? What will you focus on?



Developing a Response: main body

What is your idea? What is your response to the task?

What is the evidence to back this up?

What can you infer from the evidence?

How is your idea shown in the evidence?

How does the writer use methods / language / structure?

How does this link back to your initial idea?

How effective is this method?

Why did the writer use this? Why did they want to show this? Why did they choose to present it in this way?

What is the effect on the reader / audience?

How can you use context to develop your response further?

How many interpretations can you offer?
